CAREER PATHS

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) expects that overall employment of project management specialists is projected to grow 7% from 2023 to 2033, faster than the average for all occupations. About 77,000 openings are projected each year, on average, over the decade.

Common career paths or growth opportunities include:

Project Management Specialists

A project management specialist coordinates project details such as staffing, budgeting, and scheduling. They lead and guide the work of technical staff, serve as a point of contact for the customer, and frequently communicate with project staff to identify and resolve problems. These specialists may also deliver presentations for senior management and propose, review, and approve modifications to project plans to meet deadlines.

Project Managers

A project manager ensures the overall success of a project by planning a project's scope, promoting communication and collaboration within their team, and ensuring that everyone works together to produce high-quality work. They manage the expectations of stakeholders, identify and mitigate risks to prevent delays, and, when necessary, quickly reassess plans and alter priorities to align with new and revised goals.

Operations Managers

An operations manager oversees many aspects of an organization to ensure its success, and their responsibilities can vary depending on the organization's needs and size. While some do manage projects for their organizations, other operations managers handle budgets, inventory, staffing issues, supply chains, legal compliance, and work processes.
